A study of major elements in the development of and interactions between world societies, from the first organization of community to the dawn of the Renaissance. Students will comparatively analyze social, cultural, geographic, economic, demographic, technological, environmental, and political developments that moved humans from nomadic to agri-technological and urban lives. This course has the option of a letter grade or pass/no pass. ADVISORY: ENGL 250 and ENGL 260.


