### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This introductory course serves as a foundation for understanding language from an anthropological perspective, addressing such core questions as how, what, when, where, why and with whom we communicate. This course surveys three core areas in linguistic anthropology—structural linguistics: phonetics, phonology, morphology and syntax, as well as the biocultural basis of language; historical linguistics: origins and evolution/change, dialects, and language families; and sociocultural linguistics: language acquisition in cultural context, emphasizing the relationship between language and culture, and issues of language conservation and loss. ## Required Outside Hours 18

**Assignment Description** 

Research Project: Students will design and carry out a research project exploring a topic within the field of linguistic anthropology. They will conduct original fieldwork employing linguistic anthropological methods and analyze their findings in relation to relevant theoretical frameworks. The project will culminate in a midterm essay, comprehensive final paper, and presentation of their research—either in class or through an interactive discussion forum—to share insights and engage with peer feedback..
