COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course focuses on the care of women, newborns, and families during the childbearing experience. Emphasis is placed on physiological, psychological, and sociocultural processes of pregnancy, childbirth, postpartum recovery, and newborn adaptation. Students will apply the nursing process to promote safe, evidence-based, family-centered care while addressing health promotion, risk reduction, and common complications. Maternal assessment skills

Vital signs, fundal height, uterine tone, and lochia assessment

Leopold's maneuvers for fetal position

Fetal heart rate monitoring (intermittent auscultation, electronic fetal monitoring basics)

Cervical dilation/effacement assessment (under instructor guidance)

Newborn assessment skills

Apgar scoring

Physical assessment of newborn (head-to-toe)

Gestational age assessment

Reflex checks (Moro, rooting, grasp, etc.)

Monitoring temperature, weight, feeding

Clinical procedures

Assisting with labor and delivery (positioning, comfort measures, sterile technique)

Safe medication administration (oxytocin, magnesium sulfate, pain meds, Rh immune globulin, vaccines, etc.)

IV insertion and management

Postpartum care (perineal care, fundal massage, hemorrhage recognition)

Newborn care (bathing, cord care, feeding support, swaddling, safety checks)

Teaching breastfeeding techniques, formula feeding, and safe sleep practices
